It can happen anywhere.

It is up to all of us to help prevent sexual exploitation and human trafficking. You can make a difference in the fight against human trafficking by recognizing the signs and reporting any suspicious activity to police. Once you provide information, police will ask you some questions to determine what their next steps will be. Your call can ensure that that a victim gets the support and services they need to escape the cycle of human trafficking. If you choose to remain anonymous, your identity can be protected.

Second to drugs, human trafficking is the world's fastest growing criminal enterprise. Why?

- You can only sell drugs once.
- A person can be trafficked (sold) over and over again.
- The risks for traffickers are low, and the profits are high.

Groups identified as being the most rulnerable to human trafficking are:

- Indigenous youth
- Homeless youth
- Youth in protective care
- Youth/young adults with a history of abuse
- Newcomers to Canada

WHAT YOU CAN DO

If you think a criminal offence has taken place or may be taking

place:

- Don't intervene. Call police to report your concerns about possible human trafficking/sexual exploitation.
- Record all relevant information, such as names, locations, and addresses of possible suspicious activity, descriptors of people, vehicle license plates, makes and models of vehicles, and description of concerning activity.
